BITTERROOT SALISH

• Video: Tribal Legacy Project

Launched as part of the Expedition's bicentennial, the Tribal Legacy Project (https://www.lc-triballegacy.org/) presents native perspectives on the shared history of these areas. (Note that you will need to allow Adobe FlashPlayer.) Relevant ones include:

• Curriculum: Honoring Tribal Legacies – Sxwiwis – The Journey

Aimed at students at the secondary level, this four-part curriculum teaches about life for the Bitterroot Salish and explores the encounter with the Lewis and Clark Expedition. • Curriculum: Indian Education for All – Travelers' Rest State Park

Created by the Office of Public Instruction, this curriculum covers the Salish seasonal round, and the story of why this location is called Tmsmli (No Salmon).
